Violence and abuse is a breach of human rights

Our Goals

- Safety and equality, especially for women and children;
- Culturally safe communities, where perpetrators of violence are held accountable and patriarchal norms are challenged;
- Formal system reform that addresses male privilege; and
- A shift in the dialogue, which supports feminist principles.

The Integrated Family Violence Service

Services provided include:

- Assessment, advocacy, safety planning, support and referral for women and children who have experienced family violence;
- Information about family violence and related issues;
- Assistance to obtain crisis accommodation;
- Non-legal court support and a coordinated response with police, legal and family services; and
- Therapeutic support for women, children and young people who have experienced family violence.

Young Women's Program

Support for young women who are pregnant or parenting and experiencing housing and/or homelessness issues.

Programs For Men Who Use Violence Against Family Members

Programs for men who use violence towards family members include Men's Behaviour Change Programs (groups), support for female partners and case management support. These programs are part of a coordinated community response aimed at enhancing the safety of women and children, while inviting men to take responsibility for their use of violence and work towards achieving nonviolence in their lives.

Enhancing the safety of Women & Children

Loddon Mallee Homelessness Network

The Loddon Mallee Homelessness Network (LOMA) is a network of housing and homelessness agencies. LOMA provides co-ordination for many of the activities of these agencies including training, collaborative work, information sharing, policy responses, identification of common issues and development of solutions, raising the public awareness of homelessness and family violence and worker and agency support. LOMA also hosts the Children's Resource Program for the region.
